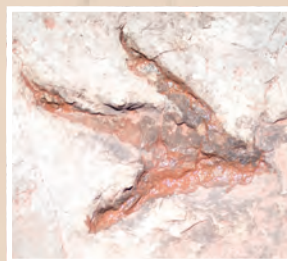

Dinosaur Tracks

Step back in time and see dinosaur tracks left in a sandstone bed. This is a great outdoor experience for the family. There is no fee, but tips are encouraged to the tour guides.

Coal Mine Canyon (Navajo & Hopi Tribes)

A scenic colorful canyon with striations of red, white and golden colors throughout. This is the result of millenia of erosion, exposing layers of red sandstone, white siltstone from the Mesozoic era. The views are stunning, perfect for taking photos and partaking in a picnic.

INSCRIPTION HOUSE, ARIZONA

Eggshell Arch

A surprise natural sandstone arch perched above one of the many canyons in the area. Accessible only by tour guide and very remote in harsh terrain. This natural wonder is a sight to be seen during the fall and winter times.

Tour guide required. Navajo Nation Photography Permit Required.

TONALEA, ARIZONA

Elephant Feet Formation

This surprising rock formation is right off U.S. Highway 160, about 25 miles east of Tuba City. Pull off the road and snap a few pics! Just lower your camera's frame a tad to show only the rock formation and have a buddy or your family pose in front of it!

PAGE, ARIZONA

Antelope Canyon (Lake Powell Tribal Park)

Walk through spectacular grooved corridors, carved by wind, rain and flash floods over the millennia and bathed each day in a wondrous light show! Book a tour guide to take you to places in Antelope Canyon that are only accessible by tour guides. There are several slot canyons in the area, the well-known ones are Upper and Lower Antelope Canyon within a couple of miles of one another.

Upper Antelope Canyon, in Navajo is, Tse'bighanilini, which means "the place where water runs through rocks." Lower Antelope Canyon in Navajo is, Hasdestwazi, which means "spiral rock arches."

CHACO CANYON, NEW MEXICO

Chaco Canyon National Historical Park (NPS)

This park reveals the unique architectural, scientific, and social achievements of a civilization that flourished between the 9th and 13th centuries. For a deeper contact with the canyon that was central to thousands of people between 850 and 1250 A.D., come and explore Chaco through guided tours, hiking & biking trails, evening campfire talks, and night sky programs. There is an available campground - Gallo Campground. Open year-round, except Thanksgiving, Christmas, and New Years Day. You can view the space availability at: recreation.gov - search for 'Gallo Campground'.

MONUMENT VALLEY, ARIZONA & UTAH

Monument Valley Navajo Tribal Park

SHIPROCK, NEW MEXICO

Shiprock Peak

Another one of the widely known natural rock formations found on the Navajo reservation - Tse' Bit'a'í - or "Rock with Wings" is a sacred formation, and is included in many Navajo stories. The peak rises 1,583 feet above the desert. Featured as landscape shots on major motion films in recent history.

Please stay on the paved road on Indian Route 13 - no entrance onto the dirt road is allowed, climbing the peak or the surrounding rocks is prohibited. Drones are prohibited.

- Indian Route 13, approx. 7 miles west from Highway 491.



BECENTI, NEW MEXICO

Bisti Badlands & De-na-zin Wilderness (BLM)

This otherworldly landscape is made up of eroded rock, hoodoos, arches, "alien eggs," and slot canyons. In 1997, a new species of Tyrannosaurus Rex was discovered in this preserve, although only the skull as excavated and is now displayed at the Museum of Natural History in Albuquerque, NM. This T-Rex was dubbed "Bisti Beast" or Bistahieversor sealeyi. To take in the entire experience, book a tour guide to take you around the wilderness and stop at notable sites.
